days. Before WWII, the corn was used for canning at the Baxter Brother's Establishment off of
Elm St.

Our potato crop was sold to Ft. Ethan Allen in Cochester, by the bushel not by the pound. As potato prices dropped, we offered "free" potatoes

for the digging."


The Whitcomb farm was established in 1867, and three generations are presently living at the farm at the end of South Street.


