

President's Message

As we end our twenty-fourth year as the Harriet Farnsworth Powell Historical Museum and the Essex Community Historical Society plans are in the works for the upcoming twenty-fifth anniversary celebration. The Board is already making plans for new displays on Essex in the museum and an exciting series of public programs. Members will see details of the Anniversary Year celebrations in the Spring 2016 newsletter. We had a busy year at the museum this year. We had the distinct honor of welcoming the Purple Heart of Bruce Baker delivered to us by Zachariah Fike of Purple Hearts Reunited, see story and pictures in this ECHO. Many thanks to Laurie Jordan for her continued support of the museum by her school tours both in Essex Center and Essex Junction. She gave tours to approximately 195 students and adults. We are happy to announce that we welcomed approximately 150 visitors to our museum; Harriet would be so pleased that her dream of educating more of our young people is growing. We also had a display at the Champlain Valley Fair.

Our Tales & Treasures of Essex public program series drew a total of around 200 people, with many of them attending for the first time. People who attended came from as far away as Barre, as well as from Burlington and South Burlington.

Arthur H. Packard Sr.One of the Most Influential Vermonters of the Twentieth Century


While recovering in the hospital, after nearly losing his arm to blood poisoning due to a farming accident, Arthur Packard was told that he had been elected to become the second president of the Vermont Farm Bureau. The Vermont Farm Bureau had formed in 1918 to provide assistance for farmers by improving farm practices, develop marketing opportunities and extending other services to the Vermont agricultural community. Mr. Packard had been president of the Chittenden County Branch of the Farm Bureau for six years, and in 1928 he became the second president of the state wide Farm Bureau organization.

Arthur Henry Packard Sr. was born on January 24, 1885 in Jericho, Vermont in the same house where his father was born and in the same town where his ancestors had been since the 1790's. He attended the Essex Classical Institute (ECI) in Essex Center only in the fall and winter terms in order to work on his father's farm during the rest of the year.

He graduated from ECI in 1904, rented the Jericho farm from his father in 1906, and was married in 1915 to Ruth Weidenbacker. Arthur and Ruth were married for 60 years and they had four children.

His first real introduction to the governmental process was from 1923 to 1924 when he served in the Vermont Legislature as the representative for the Town of Jericho. This set the stage for his lobbying efforts when he became the president of the Vermont Farm Bureau four years later. He was president for 25 years of the Vermont Farm Bureau and his influence brought "...significant change and progress..." Note 1 to the fledgling organization where he was often known as "Mr. Agriculture" Note 2 and "The second Will Rogers" Note 3. He was instrumen tal in making affordable insurance available to farmers, had a leading role in establishment of cooperatives within the State and was a driving force in Rural Electrification Administration (REA) expansion to rural areas in Vermont. He also served on the national board of the American Farm Bureau Federation for ten years. Dean Carrigan of the University of Vermont said, "He had the trust and respect of Vermont farmers, not so much because he is considered an authority on farm matters all over the country, as because he is one of them." Note 4. Recognizing him as a state and national leader of stature, the University of Vermont granted Mr. Packard an honorary Doctor of Laws degree. Note 3.

Although the Farm Bureau as an organization did not get involved in political activity, "Packard was directly or indirectly involved in many political battles." Note 1. He supported Governor George Aiken in State affairs, and later worked with Senator Aiken on national issues. In 1946 he "...was, in large part, responsible for a major political upset." Note 1 when he rallied the Farm Bureau members to support Ernest Gibson II for Governor which led to the unseating of Mortimer Proctor who had served only one term in office. His influence in State politics continued



for many years and former governor Deane Davis in his autobiography noted that Arthur Packard was "...perhaps the single most powerful political figure in the state." Note 5.

Mr. Packard wore many hats besides his position as the president of the Vermont Farm bureau, all directed to providing benefits to farmers. He was the state agent for Nationwide Insurance Co. from 1928 until he retired in 1965, was one of ten representatives of the American Farm Bureau sent to Europe in 1948 and was a director in numerous organizations including; Eastern Region National Farm Bureau for 10 years, Production Credit for six years, Co-operative Insurance Co. of Middlebury and Eastern States Farmers Exchange.

Arthur Packard's connection to Essex goes beyond his graduation from the Essex Classical Institute as he was also a member of the Grange in Essex Center and was instrumental in sustaining an important business in Essex. In 1926 the Vermont Maple Products Association of Essex Jct. got into



debt...and was forced to close its doors... A contract was signed with the Carey Maple Sugar Co. of St. Johnsbury and Mr. Packard was asked to travel through Vermont selling farmers the idea of marketing their syrup under this contract. Mr. Packard helped organize Maple Sugar Festivals to raise money with final result that the members were

able to reorganize in 1932 free of debt. Note 3. In 2006, in recognition of his contribution to the agricultural community, Mr. Packard was inducted posthumously into the Vermont Agricultural Hall of Fame at the Champlain Valley (Fair) Exposition.

Chris Graff, a reporter for the Associated Press in Vermont for more than 25 years, described his reporting on primarily the political issues of the times in his book "Dateline Vermont". At the end of the book Graff listed what he considered "The 10 Most Influential Vermonters of the 20th Century" Note 4. The list included such notables as George Aiken, Deane Davis, Phil Hoff, and Ernest Gibson II and at number 10, Arthur Packard.

Arthur H. Packard Sr. died in 1976 at the age of 91 and "At his funeral, the Reverend Lillian Gregory called Packard "a man who was very likely the most influential and powerful man of his time in the State, who never sought high office or power for himself, but rather, worked hard to help people." Note 1.

Purple Heart Ceremony

This summer a ceremony was held at the Harriet Farnsworth Powell Museum for Purple Hearts Reunited to return PFC Bruce Baker's Purple Heart to the town where he lived as a child.

Purple Hearts Reunited is a non-profit organization that works to return last Purple Hearts to their owners or family members (for more information on Purple Hearts Reunited see their web page). PFC Baker's Purple Heart was given to Purple Hearts Reunited by Bruce's stepmother's second husband, Norman Thompson. Mr. Thompson had found the Purple Heart packed away in a box of his wife's things. In the box with the Purple Heart, were the telegram notifying the family of Bruce's death and a condolence letter from President Lyndon Johnson.

PFC Bruce Baker was a member of Lima Company, 3rd BN, 5th Marines (USMC) and on July 24, 1966, in Quang Tri Province, Vietnam, he sustained fragmentation wounds to the abdomen and chest while engaged in action against hostile forces. These injuries resulted in his death.

Purple Hearts Reunited searched for Bruce's family and found that both his parents were deceased and a younger brother, David, was killed in an auto accident in 1972. Since there were no surviving family, Captain Zachariah Fike, the founder of Purple Hearts Reunited, approached the Essex Community Historical Society about the possibility of returning his Purple Heart to us and the Board agreed to accept it.

The return ceremony was held on July 25, a day after the anniversary of Bruce's death. It was part of a day-long remembrance of Bruce Baker. The day started at the Vietnam Veterans' Memorial on I-89 in Sharon. After a short service, a Vietnam Veterans' Motorcycle group and Purple Hearts Reunited traveled up I-89 to Essex Center for the return ceremony at the Harriet Farnsworth Powell Museum. In addition to the Vietnam Veterans' Motorcycle Group and Purple Hearts Reunited, members of the Essex Community Historical Society and the Green Mountain Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution were in attendance. A beautifully framed Purple Heart was presented by Purple Hearts Reunited and accepted by the Essex Community Historical Society.



The last part of the remembrance was a trip to Bruce's grave in Fairview Cemetery where after a few words were said and the Marine Corps hymn was sung, each member of the Vietnam Veterans Motorcycle Group, one-by-one, gave PFC Bruce Baker a final salute.

Bruce's Purple Heart is currently displayed, and will continue to be displayed, at the Harriet Farnsworth Powell Museum alongside the World War II Purple Heart belonging to Claude Chapin. The Essex Community

Historical Society is honored that Purple Hearts Reunited and the Chapin family felt we would be good custodians for the Purple Hearts of two Essex soldiers who made the ultimate sacrifice for their county.

ECHS Members Came Through in 2014!

ECHS members may have been surprised to see financial pie charts in the spring, 2015, newsletter. The charts, done by ECHS Treasurer Ann Gray, expressed a commitment by the Board to increase our financial transparency. Accompanying the charts were the names of thirty-nine donors who generously responded to our first ever Annual Giving Campaign in 2014.

A total of \$1255 from twenty-six donors went into undesignated general funds. Donations designated for the Abram Stevens Gravestone Restoration Fund totaled \$670 from thirteen donors.

In this newsletter, members will see charts showing types and amounts of expenditures for the ECHS fiscal year October 1, 2014 to September 30, 2015. Our major expense in 2015, the new roof put on the 1805 School House on the Essex Common, was paid for out of the Schoolhouse Fund. The Ron Clapp Memorial Fund retained its standing balance. The Town Fund and General Fund were used to pay expenses. And the Tales & Treasures of Essex Fund, made up of designated donations from sponsors for our public program series, ended with a small balance.

In this newsletter, members will find a donation envelope for our 2015-16 Annual Giving Campaign. And the year 2016 is going to be BIG – it's the Essex Community Historical Society 25th Anniversary Year! The ECHS Board has plans well under way for an even bigger series of public programs, as well as a summer long advertising campaign to invite Essex residents into both new museum displays on Essex and new programs.

The support of our members is what will make this celebration the most exciting year since the museum opening in 1991! Members may donate to either the General Fund or the Tales & Treasures of Essex Fund, which will support both programs and advertising for the Anniversary Year. Donations may also be designated to the Abram Stevens Gravestone Restoration Fund or the Schoolhouse Fund.








ECHS Fall 2015 Financial Report
